
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AWEX - EMI v USD Last Two Years



Over the past 12 months the AWEX-EMI has increased in two big 'steps'. Since the release of a revalued EMI there have been steep increases in early November and then again in January. Meanwhile, the relationship between the EMI and USD, previously a generally consistent inverse trend, has not been seen during the period of November to January. Instead the EMI has even mimicked the USD movements as both the EMI and USD reached 12 month highs in January. These 'iumps' in the EMI value are possibly attributable to the seriousness of the drought and shearing consequential decreased wool supply. However, the recent increased demand appears to have leveled off in the last couple of weeks as the EMI has retreated since hitting a peak on the 18th of January.


Classing House Code of Practice

The Australian Wool Exchange Ltd is pleased to announce the release of the 2007-2009 Woolclassers' Code of Practice for the Preparation of Australian Wool Clips (COP).

What's New?

Format

Our aim was to make the 2007 Code of Practice a reference document that each Woolclasser would find easy, interesting and informative to read.

The Code is now printed in full colour, with the chapters in chronological work flow order. We have also used Symbols to identify Best Practice, Key Points, Frequently Asked Questions and Don't Forget points. The Code is spiral bound so it is more robust and can lie flat or be folded back.

Woolgrower Responsibilities

At the request of Woolclassers the COP now includes a section on Woolgrower responsibilities. This section highlights areas where woolgrowers assist the Woolclasser and the Shearing team in delivering a product that all parties can be proud of.

Bale Description Template

For the first time the COP includes a Bale Description template that uses a standard methodology across all sectors. This template is structured to reflect the four core woolclassing components. It identifies:

- The classed line, The breed group,
- The category of wool, and
- · Identification of actual or risk of Pigmented/Medullated fibre contamination.
- The template approach has great strengths:
- a) It is easy to interpret, and every description tells the customer what is in the bale.
- b) It allows wool description components to be displayed on a one-page poster. c) It communicates to everyone in the shearing shed the key characteristics that must be identified and separated.
- d) It assists in training and educating new woolclassers.
- e) Bale Descriptions can be added or removed easily (in future Codes) within the template framework.

Describing Wool - key changes

- The 2007 COP Bale Description template represents some changes in practice. The key items are
- a) Sheep Breed Group is to be identified on ALL lines of wool. b) The P suffix (for medullated fibre in the 2004 COP) is now K.
- c) The AA descriptor is used to identify secondary lines where the characteristics
- cannot be measured. d) Cast line descriptors should be used where the line clearly represents the
- classed characteristic. e) The AAA descriptor should be used on Main lines of wool, including those that are classed out for a measured characteristic. The BBB line (made as a broad
- line) should now be described as AAA (Breed) and indicated on the specification sheet as classed out for broad (and not to be matched). The measured (micron) result will indicate that it is a broad line. f) Some descriptors have been removed from the 2004 COP.

Sheep Breed Characteristics

The characteristics of Sheep Breeds were first published in the 2004 Code of Practice. This included a (Pigmented and Medullated) Risk Rating from 1 to 5. To avoid confusion with the recently introduced Merino Dark and Medullated Risk (DMFR) scheme, the Woolclassers' Code of Practice now uses a rating of Very Low to Very High

Inclusion of the Merino Dark and Medullated Fibre Risk (DMFR) Scheme

The recently introduced Industry DMFR scheme is included in the 2007 Code of Practice in Section 7. We have also included easy to understand definitions of Dark, Medullated and

Pre Shearing Checklist

Pigmented fibres (page 23).

A pre shearing Woolclasser's checklist is included. This is one page only and is a handy summary reference for woolclassers to ensure the major points have been covered pre shearing.

Bulk Class Bale Tear Off Sheets





Typical Merino Clip -Bale Descriptions


